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PRESIDENT'S STATEMENT

The Toowoomba Chamber of Commerce remains fiercely independent, advocating for local businesses across all levels of government. This independence is not just preserved, it is essential to ensuring our business community's voice cuts through.

As we close our 125th year, the words from our founding on October 12, 1899, ring clear: a vigilant and united body can readily discuss anomalies and abuses which, if left unchecked, work to the detriment of the community. Stepping into my third year as President, I see this truth has not dimmed it is, in fact, amplified. What one voice questions, five hundred voices demand answers to.

Our work this year has been anchored by the Chamber's three pillars: advocacy, education, and connection. These are not separate activities they are interwoven threads that strengthen when pulled together.

Through connection, we delivered over forty events to more than 3,700 participants. These were not just networking opportunities, they were deliberate platforms for businesses to find support, find suppliers, find customers, expand their reach, and grow their brands. Our "Business at Dusk" series continued its momentum, with Feed Central's January event drawing our largest crowd yet as we celebrated the 2024 Little Pig Consulting Business of the Year. We have collaborated with members to co-facilitate breakfasts, roundtables, and industry gatherings that matter.

Education drove our response to the issues businesses raised with us: declining sentiment, industrial relations complexity, budget impacts, and AI's disruption of traditional models. We researched, engaged experts, and created forums where members could understand the forces reshaping their operations. Our "The Ayes Have It" forum provided direct access to local representatives during election season, while our sold-out "Breakfast with the Treasurer" post-budget event drew standing room only, though the full story there will belong in next year's report.

Advocacy remains at our core. We did not just observe the challenges facing businesses, we compiled comprehensive election priorities and delivered them to prospective and then newly elected officials at both state and federal levels, ensuring your concerns landed on the right desks. With over 550 members, the Toowoomba Chamber stands as one of Australia's largest regional chambers and Queensland's biggest. This scale is not a statistic, it is our leverage. When 550 businesses raise the same concern, governments listen differently than when one does.

As proud partners of the Darling Downs Regional Alliance, we represent over 1,000 businesses across the Toowoomba Regional Council area. This concentrated strength positions us as a primary source of influence across all government tiers. Your membership does not just support the Chamber, it multiplies your own voice.

PRESIDENT'S STATEMENT

Financial pressure intensified for everyone this year: individuals, businesses, and yes, the Chamber itself. Rising rates, climbing administrative and workforce costs, persistent housing shortages, we have felt the weight collectively. That is precisely why we push relentlessly for payroll tax relief, housing supply increases, and red tape reduction. Our advocacy, informed by the education we provide and amplified through the connections we build, creates pressure that matters.

Yet opportunity runs parallel to challenge. The Brisbane 2032 Olympics equestrian events announcement proves our region's global appeal. Now comes the crucial work, securing Toowoomba's rightful share of rail infrastructure, accommodation development, and niche tourism investment. This will require all three pillars working in concert by educating stakeholders on the opportunities, connecting businesses to capitalise on them, and advocating for the infrastructure investment our region deserves.

As a member organisation receiving no direct government funding, we exist because you do. Your financial support, your engagement at events, your willingness to speak up, this drives everything we achieve.

My sincere thanks to our leadership team, Vice Presidents Sam Wright and Barton Castley, Treasurer Peter Rowe, and Board Members Jenni Butler, Matt Gregg, Shelley Burchett, and Tim Dodds. The integrity, strategic thinking, and genuine passion this board brings to supporting Toowoomba businesses is remarkable. The trust we have built allows us to make decisions swiftly and confidently.

Your time and commitment humble me. We also acknowledge our departing board members, Gordon Grover, Rouz Fard, and Gary Wilson for their valuable contributions.

Finally, Todd Rohl's five-year tenure with the Chamber has been exemplary, thank you, while Tanaya Treadwell, Lucas Wegener, Georgie Carswell, and Faiz Tamar are working to transform our board's strategic vision into daily reality.

The year ahead will test us. It will also reward those who choose to engage, advocate, and act collectively. That is not rhetoric it is simply what 125 years of evidence tells us.

TREASURER'S REPORT

Like many of our members, as a small business in Toowoomba the Chamber continues to plan and adapt using the information at hand, current legislation, and prevailing economic sentiment.

The business environment remains dynamic, requiring flexibility and agility to seize opportunities and shield against challenges. For the 2024/2025 financial year, the Chamber's financial position reflects the challenges faced by all businesses, with the Chamber team and board keeping an eye to the future and improved efficiencies.

From a financial perspective, the 2025 year resulted in a net loss of \$91,142, with retained earnings at year-end of \$270,929.

The net loss noted, while initially concerning, is not reflective of the true position, due to a change in the way we report our in kind support, which will allow us to move into 2025/2026 with adjusted rigour in our accounting protocols.

Adjusting for this conscious change, the true net loss is a figure of \$ 53,475.

Income for the year has decreased to \$1,143,238 down from \$ 1,430,740 in 2024.

This decrease is due to:

- a \$ 194,303 decrease in grant funding, for programs not continued
- a decline in event ticket sales – reflective of economic climate

Expenses have reduced to \$ 1,234,380 this year, down from \$1,413,025 in 2024.

This can be attributed to:

- consultant and subcontractor expense reductions through program closures and spending reviews

- ongoing commitment by the Board to enhance Toowoomba Chamber and member outreach
- careful management of office and operational expenditure
- reduction in food, beverage and hospitality event costs
- additional expenditure requirements of the CEO transition

The Chamber's asset base remains strong, with gross assets of \$546,991 and net assets of \$270,929.

The Chamber Team and Board have started the 2026 financial year with a strong focus on operating as a successful small business in the community, resulting in event profitability reviews, new event and partnership opportunities and operational expenditure management.

We are a community based not for profit organisation, with the increasing expenses showing we are investing fully back into our members and the Toowoomba region.

The Toowoomba Chamber Board does not receive any remuneration for their service. Except for tickets to the monthly Business@Dusk event and a ticket to the Little Pig Consulting Business Excellence Awards provided to the President, Board members purchase tickets to all functions, like all other valued Toowoomba Chamber members.

The Chamber remains in a positive financial position to continue delivering value, creating connections, and supporting business growth.

BUSINESS CONNECT

This past year has been full of activity with two valuable projects simultaneously being delivered under the Business Connect banner.

Firstly, the 'Assisting Women Into the Workforce (AWIW)' program which we created to address the growing need for support among mature age women to re-enter the workforce. Project activities were centred around assisting women into the workforce through individually tailored workforce preparation and pathways to employment.

At its core, this program focused on fostering connections - connecting with peers in similar situations, engaging with mentors for inspiration and learning, and linking with employers for volunteer opportunities and employment.

This program concluded on 30th June 2025, having produced significant metric outcomes. A total of 25 women were supported throughout the program, with 24 participants completing the program and 21 women supported with an employment pathway.

Additionally, the AWIW program generated many valuable outcomes for participants including:

- **Skill Development and Confidence Building:** Participants received assistance in identifying and building confidence in their unique skills and abilities. This included skill matching and applying transferable skills to various job areas.
- **Employment Readiness:** Comprehensive support covered resume writing, job searching, interview preparation, and crafting an effective Elevator Pitch. These activities helped participants become more employable and prepared for the workforce.
- **Mentoring and Coaching:** Ongoing mentoring and coaching were provided to improve confidence and employability. This support continued throughout the employment process and post-placement.
- **Collaborative Efforts:** The program collaborated with TAFE Queensland's Back to Work Program and People First Bank. TAFE Queensland provided career assessment support, while People First Bank offered insightful sessions and financial assistance for participants' personal grooming needs.
- **Networking Opportunities:** The Networking Lunch allowed participants to connect with potential employers and showcase their networking skills. This event fostered a sense of community and support, empowering women and creating a network of connections that will continue to support their employment journeys.

BUSINESS CONNECT

The Assisting Women into the Workforce program is a testament to the power of tailored support and community collaboration. It has transformed lives, instilled confidence, and opened doors to new opportunities.

Toowoomba Chamber's Business Connect program continues to deliver meaningful results by fostering connections that support the long-term integration of Yazidis refugees into the business community. We are consistently creating pathways to employment for this cohort, as more employers recognise the value of refugee jobseekers and actively seek them out to address workforce gaps.

In March 2025, Toowoomba Chamber was granted funding of \$175,100 from the Department of Trade, Employment and Training (DTET) under the Skilling Queenslanders for Work (SQW) Program to continue the current 'Ready for Work' project model.

We hosted our annual Business Connect networking event on Thursday 20th March 2025, in conjunction with a graduation ceremony for our Skilling Queenslanders for Work participants. This special evening celebrated the dedication and hard work of our participants and showcasing the success of our Business Connect program. We would like to acknowledge and thank our event partner and Chamber member, Angie's Elite Cleaning Solutions, for supporting this event.

Over the past 12 months, 82 Yazidis jobseekers have completed pre-employment training and mentoring under our SQW 'Ready for Work' program. During this time, 49 participants have been assisted into employment, including 15 participants from last year's program.

FUTURE LEADERS ADVISORY GROUP - REIMAGINED

This year, the Toowoomba Chamber undertook a strategic rebrand of the Future Leaders Advisory Group (FLAG), now known as the Toowoomba Young Chamber. The decision to rebrand was driven by a desire to better reflect the group's evolving role and to more clearly communicate its purpose to the broader business community.

THE EMERGING LEADERS MENTOR PROGRAM

The Toowoomba Chamber of Commerce and Toowoomba Regional Jobs Committee once again joined forces to deliver the Emerging Leaders Mentoring Program (ELMP).

The program ran over 12 months and included monthly meetings between mentees and mentors, 6 workshops throughout the year covering topics such as leadership, mental health in the workplace, business strategy and financial acumen.

We thank all mentors and mentees who actively participated in the mentor program.

YOUNG CHAMBER ADVISORY GROUP

In July there was an Expression of Interest undertaken seeking new members to help lead the charge in connecting, learning and influencing across our region. The group has quickly become active and are excited to launch new initiatives for 2026.

FOOD & AGRI + CBD REVITALISATION

FOOD & AGRI NETWORK

This year has been a period of continuity for the Food and Agri Network (FAN). The focus has been on maintaining active relationships across the sector and ensuring FAN remains present and engaged within the Chamber's broader activities. It has been a year of consolidation where FAN has been positioning the network to re-energise and refocus its activity for the year ahead.

Key highlights included the successful continuation of the Tastes of Our Town luncheon series, which showcased local chefs and strengthened community connections. FAN also contributed to strategic planning sessions and maintained visibility across industry forums. While new initiatives were limited, these efforts ensured FAN remained a trusted voice for food and agriculture in the region.

Financially, FAN operated within a stable framework, integrating its activities into Chamber budgeting processes. Looking forward, the priority will be revitalisation and growth, with plans to introduce new programs and strengthen partnerships in 2025–2026.

CBD REVITALISATION ADVISORY COMMITTEE

The CBD Revitalisation Advisory Committee (CBD-RAC) continued its mission to position Toowoomba's city centre as a vibrant economic and cultural hub. This year focused on consolidating priorities and advancing advocacy for transformative infrastructure investment to ignite the city heart. The committee worked closely with Toowoomba Regional Council to align revitalisation strategies with community needs and long-term economic goals.

Key achievements included promoting the CBD as a unique destination, supporting activation programs such as Christmas in the CBD and Carnival in the CBD, and advocating for practical improvements like consistent parking policies and signage upgrades.

Looking ahead, CBD-RAC will focus on working alongside key members of the Economic Development team at Toowoomba Regional Council to prioritise key infrastructure needs to ensure a successful and vibrant city ahead of the 2032 Olympics. These efforts, combined with a bold vision for a catalytic development in the city centre, aim to strengthen Toowoomba's position as a thriving regional destination.

NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS

FOR THE YEAR ENDED 30 JUNE 2025

The financial statements cover Toowoomba Chamber of Commerce and Industry Inc as an individual entity. Toowoomba Chamber of Commerce and Industry Inc is a not-for-profit association incorporated in Queensland under the Associations Incorporation Act 1981 ('the Act').

The functional and presentation currency of Toowoomba Chamber of Commerce and Industry Inc is Australian dollars.

Comparatives are consistent with prior years, unless otherwise stated.

1 Basis of preparation

In the opinion of the Committee of Management, the association is not a reporting entity since there are unlikely to exist users of the financial statements who are not able to command the preparation of reports tailored so as to satisfy specifically all of their information needs. These special purpose financial statements have been prepared to meet the reporting requirements of the Act.

The financial statements have been prepared on an accruals basis and are based on historical costs modified, where applicable, by the measurement at fair value of selected non-current assets, financial assets and financial liabilities.

The following significant accounting policies, which are consistent with the previous period unless stated otherwise, have been adopted in the preparation of this financial report.

2 Summary of significant accounting policies

Income tax

No provision for income tax has been raised as the association has self-assessed exempt from income tax under Division 50 of the Income Tax Assessment Act 1997.

Revenue and other income

Revenue is recognised when the amount of the revenue can be measured reliably, it is probable that economic benefits associated with the transaction will flow to the Association and specific criteria relating to the type of revenue as noted below, has been satisfied.

Revenue is measured at the fair value of the consideration received or receivable and is presented net of returns, discounts and rebates.

In kind revenue and expenses

- Revenue is recorded on signing of sponsorship agreement in a contra income account
- The expense is recorded on utilisation and is moved from contra to revenue account
- If agreement covers more than a one year period an entry is made to the accrued income liability account

Business Awards

Revenue from business awards is combined with Registrations and recognised on receipt of revenue.

Membership

Membership to the association runs for a 12 month period from the date of joining. Revenue is recognised on receipt of revenue.

Grant Revenue

Grant revenue is recognised in the income statement when the entity obtains control of the grant, it is probable that the economic benefits gained from the grant will flow to the entity and the amount of the grant can be measured reliably.

Interest Revenue

Interest is recognised on receipt.

Goods and services tax (GST)

Revenues, expenses and assets are recognised net of the amount of GST, except where the amount of GST incurred is not recoverable from the Australian Taxation Office (ATO).

Receivables and payables are stated inclusive of GST.

Property, plant and equipment

Each class of plant and equipment is carried at cost or fair value less, where applicable, any accumulated depreciation and impairment.

Items of plant and equipment acquired for nil or nominal consideration have been recorded at the acquisition date fair value.

At the end of each annual reporting period, the depreciation method, useful life and residual value of each asset is reviewed. Any revisions are accounted for prospectively as a change in estimate.

Depreciation

Plant and equipment is depreciated on a straight-line basis over the assets useful life to the Association, commencing when the asset is ready for use.

The Association has a capitalisation policy to fully depreciate any assets with a cost under \$1,000.

Cash and cash equivalents

Cash and cash equivalents comprises cash on hand, demand deposits and short-term investments which are readily convertible to known amounts of cash and subject to an insignificant risk of change in value.

Employee Benefits - Provision for Long Service Leave

The liability for long service leave is recognised and measured at the present value of the estimated future cash flows to be made in respect of all employees with 7 or more years service at the reporting date. In determining the present value of the liability, attention rates and pay increases through promotion and inflation have been taken into account.

No long service leave is accrued on the balance sheet as no current staff member has provided more than 7 years of service.

Charges, securities or mortgages

No charge, security or mortgage effects the associations property.

Provisions

Provisions are recognised when the association has a legal or constructive obligation, as a result of past events, for which it is probable that an outflow of economic benefits will result and that outflow can be reliably measured.

Provisions are measured at the present value of management's best estimate of the outflow required to settle the obligation at the end of the reporting period. The discount rate used is a pre-tax rate that reflects current market assessments of the time value of money and the risks specific to the liability. The increase in the provision due to the unwinding of the discount is taken to finance costs in the statement of profit or loss and other comprehensive income.

Critical Accounting Estimates and Judgements

Those changes with governance make estimates and judgments during the preparation of these financial statements regarding assumptions about current and future events affecting transactions and balances.

These estimates and judgements are based on the best information available at the time of preparing the financial statements, however as additional information is known then the actual results may differ from the estimates.

Key estimates - provisions

Key estimates - receivables

The receivables at reporting date have been reviewed to determine whether there is any objective evidence that any of the receivables are impaired. An impairment provision is included for any receivable where the entire balance is not considered collectible. The impairment provision is based on the best information at the reporting date.

Key estimates - Useful lives of depreciable assets

Management reviews its estimate of the useful lives of depreciable assets at each reporting date, based on expected utility of the assets. Uncertainties in these estimates relate to technical obsolescence that may change the utility of certain software and IT equipment.
